

From the Supervisor New Zoning Code Provides for Improvement; Protects What We Care About

This is a welcome opportunity for me to express my gratitude to the people of Pittsford for sharing your views with me and the Town Board over recent years, as we've put together a new Comprehensive Plan and subsequently, as we've revised our Town Zoning Code based on that Plan.

Your advice throughout both processes is what has made possible a new Zoning Code that embodies the views, interests and wishes of the broad consensus of our community.

Town Board approved a revised Zoning Code on March 16, culminating an open and public process. Just as we held a series of open workshops for the Comprehensive Plan, the Board met in a series of special public sessions to review and revise the Zoning Code section-by-section, with two public hearings on the full revision. Your comments and clearly expressed preferences directly defined our Comprehensive Plan and the new Zoning Code based upon it.

Clearly the views of elected officials are influential in shaping public outcomes. Yet representative government shines most admirably when its priority in pursuing results rests not so much on what *we* think, but on what *you* think. Our new Zoning Code honors that principle, both in what it changes and in what it doesn't. It's a plan for continual improvement, that lets Pittsford be Pittsford.

Here are the principal substantive points of our new Zoning Code:

Residential neighborhoods: Residential neighborhoods won't change. Neighborhoods of single-family homes will stay that way. As per existing Code, houses can't be modified to include a separate apartment, and the rule remains one house per lot.

"In-Law" Suites: The Code makes it easier to provide a suite for privacy for a parent or other family member, in a way that doesn't create a separate apartment within the house.

Attached Houses: For new construction on currently unbuilt tracts, the revised Code gives broader scope for single-family attached houses, like Greenpoint Trail and Alpine Ridge. This would not apply to new construction in existing residential neighborhoods of single-family detached houses.

Incentive Zoning: The new Code builds into the existing Incentive Zoning law new provisions to encourage more moderately priced market-rate housing for people in or approaching retirement age.

More Housing Variety: The new Code extends Incentive Zoning opportunities Town-wide. This can allow for greater density and thereby for housing priced more moderately than what has been available traditionally.

Monroe Avenue Commercial Corridor: The new Code offers a comprehensive vision for improving the Monroe Avenue commercial corridor. The goal is to create a mixed-use commercial district with a more village-like feel and of more walkable scale. To do this it provides for storefronts at the street and parking to their rear, with housing above the streetside storefronts. In addition to the mix of commercial and residential, the new Code provides for a greater variety of businesses, including microbreweries and boutique hotels.

Keeping Chickens: The revised code permits keeping chickens, within reasonable limitations, on residential lots. Households keeping chickens must maintain a coop sited at least 50 feet from neighboring property lines. Regulations for keeping bees also have been included.

Parking: New parking regulations promote less asphalt and more landscaped islands in areas of redevelopment, as well as stronger guidelines for the provision of pedestrian connections in parking lots.

Lighting: New dark-sky lighting regulations protect residents from intrusive light from adjacent properties. These regulations benefit wildlife and the environment as well.

Former Golf Courses: Our Zoning Code now provides that, if a golf course closes and sells its land, the density of any housing to be built will be substantially consistent with existing residential areas, with requirements for open space and buffering. This rezoning makes no changes to existing golf courses or their operations. It makes a difference only if a golf course goes out of business and sells its land for development.

Environmental Stewardship: The new Code encourages and provides compatibility guidelines for beneficial environmental practices and infrastructure, such as solar energy systems, electrical vehicle charging stations, installation of geothermal and more. You'll find the new Zoning Code on the Town website here: **www.townofpittsford.org/zoningcode**. The new Code includes other changes you'd expect: in formatting, such as consolidating definitions for ease of reference; revising citations to State law as necessary, clarifying sections where experience showed the existing language to be ambiguous, deleting outdated or obsolete provisions; accommodating new practices and preferences of residents that have emerged since the last Zoning Code update in 2009.

Like so many of you, I hold a deep appreciation of what we have here in Pittsford in terms of open space and the balance between suburban and rural. I grew up in a place where I watched, from boyhood to early adulthood, as what was once a substantially rural corridor became almost completely paved over. It left a lasting impression: that there had to be a better way. One better way we found in Pittsford was by enacting the Greenprint, that preserved two-thirds of the farmland in Town when we enacted it in 1996. Land that remains open and protected.

Although our new Zoning Code doesn't involve the Greenprint farms – it doesn't because they can't be built upon – it rests on the same foundation: a sensibility broadly shared among Pittsford residents about how, consistent always with the rights of property owners, land use at each place in Town affects the whole community; how it can add to or detract from that unique collection of characteristics that make Pittsford recognizable as the place we've chosen to live.

The great strength of our new Code is that it represents the wishes of the overwhelming majority of our community. You expressed it in our public sessions for the Zoning Code, and earlier in the Community Survey and public workshops that shaped our Comprehensive Plan. We've respected your wishes.

Now it's the duty of our Town Staff and Volunteer Boards to apply the new Zoning Code and to educate the public about it. It's my duty and the duty of our Town Board to continue to honor your wishes by upholding and preserving our new Code.

I can do my job best when you let me know what you need and what you think needs attention. Please contact me whenever the Town can help. Let me know your suggestions for improvements in Pittsford. I maintain an open-door policy in the office, answer my own phone unless I'm in a meeting or on another line and have a monthly Saturday open house for residents at the Library's Fisher Meeting Room. The new park area offers improvements and carries on the legacy of our original, iconic Copper Beech tree. It includes a tree cultivated from a cutting from the original copper beech. It now grows where it will thrive and give enjoyment to generations to come.

Spring Cleaning Recycling Drop is June 7 *Collecting electronics, scrap metal, paint and clothing*



To make it easier for you to get rid of many items that could be recycled instead of being put in the trash, the Town has organized a Spring Cleaning Drop on Saturday, June 7 from 9:00am to noon at Pittsford Mendon High School. **It's free for Pittsford residents!** Town staff will collect electronics, scrap metal and paint for recycling. We'll provide secure document shredding as well. Women's Club of Pittsford volunteers will collect clothing items and linens.

Electronics Recycling

- Accepted items include: computers and computer accessories (keyboards, mice, etc.), laptops, mobile devices, printers, video, audio and stereo equipment, televisions, wiring, cables, and **rechargeable** batteries
- *Not accepted:* please do NOT bring small or large appliances; we cannot accept toasters, vacuum cleaners, coffee makers, hair dryers, irons, stoves, refrigerators, air conditioners, washers, dryers, etc., or **non-rechargeable** batteries

Paint Recycling

- Paints, primers, stains, sealers and clear coatings such as shellac and varnish will be accepted
- Must be in the original container with original label, covered with a secure lid
- Please do NOT bring aerosol coatings/spray paint, solvents and industrial/non-architectural use paints

Scrap Metal Recycling

• Accepting various metal items made of steel, stainless steel, iron, cast iron, copper, brass, or aluminum – including siding and gutters, wires, pipes, electrical components, insulated wires, sheet metal and other items made of metal (no large appliances)

Certified Document Shredding

- · Secure shredding, personal/residential documents only
- · No need to remove staples or paper clips

Clothing Donations

- Used clothing, shoes, sneakers, belts, purses, linens, pillowcases, blankets and curtains will be accepted
- Items that are no longer wearable/usable will be recycled

Town of Pittsford Climate Action Plan

Promoting a healthy environment is a central policy of the Town of Pittsford. It has been for decades. We've been environmentally conscious since before it was cool.

Over time, both technology and new opportunities at the state and federal levels have allowed the Town to build on its record and carry forward its environmental commitment. A recent example is our Climate Action Plan.

The Town's Climate Action Plan addresses climate protection. It promotes energy savings and advances community goals for public health and safety. It will assess the Town's current climate protection initiatives and identify potential action items in several key focus areas, including municipal operations, waste and recycling, renewable energy, and preserving existing resources.

The Town's Department of Public Works and the Environmental Advisory Board have completed the portion of the Climate Action Plan covering municipal operations. We're grateful for assistance throughout this process from the Genesee-Finger Lakes Regional Planning Council. The Plan incorporates advice from other agencies and from students at Rochester Institute of Technology, who worked on data regarding greenhouse gas emissions.

Altogether it's the result of a detailed and studious process that involved many hours of research, analysis and planning by all participants. You'll find this plan for a greener future for Pittsford on the Town website at www.townofpittsford.org/climate_action_plan.

Thanks to all who contributed to this central component of our Climate Action Plan, to everyone working on the next part and to you, our residents, for helping to keep Pittsford green.



Know the rules, respect the neighbors

Several neighborhoods in Town have experienced problems due to large gatherings after dark in Town parks and open spaces. The problems include adjacent streets clogged with cars, noise and underage alcohol use.

The Town, School District and the Sheriff's Office have partnered to prevent such problems from happening, and to address them immediately when they do.

Know the rules for Town open spaces and parks after dark:

• After-dark gatherings are illegal in Town parks and open spaces, except for:

- Athletic games at Thornell Farm Park and events booked at King's Bend Park
- · All other parks and open spaces are closed after dark
- Alcohol is prohibited in Town parks and open spaces, with the exception of reserved events at King's Bend Park
- If you are in a park after closing, or in an open space like the Lusk Farm Recreation Space by Mill Neck Lane and it is after dark, you are trespassing and may be ticketed
- If you are underage and found drinking in any of our parks and open spaces, you will be ticketed

We're glad to welcome young people to our parks and open spaces. To ensure their safety and to respect nearby neighbors, please make sure your kids understand and follow the rules and laws related to Town lands.



Lawn Care Tips

Pittsford has a policy of eco-consciousness. Every year, on all 3,000 acres the Town maintains, the Town uses a smaller amount of chemical herbicides and pesticides than just one house on a half-acre lot that employs a lawn service.


You can maintain a beautiful lawn without chemicals! If you have a lawn care contract, review it this spring to see if you can skip the chemicals. And please check out Pittsford's **Toxic-Free Lawn Challenge**. Participants in the program:

- Avoid non-organic pesticides and herbicides.
- Use organic-slow-release fertilizer only in the fall.
- Avoid spring and summer applications, which stress lawns.
- Raise their lawnmower blade to three inches or higher, return clippings to the lawn, and keep blades sharp.
- Develop healthy soil. Instead of using chemicals, add a top layer of organic materials and aerate every 1-2 years.
- Water only in the morning, if at all.
- Consider planting native plants. Native plants require less water and care and don't need chemicals to thrive.
- · Patch bare spots quickly to avoid weed growth.

Only Rain Down the Drain



Please remember that our **storm drains discharge water directly into nearby streams**. Dumping materials like pet waste, pesticides, fertilizers, car oil and cleaning products into storm drains pollutes our watershed, degrades water quality and harms wildlife and habitats.

Please help make sure that "only rain goes down the drain."

Dispose of chemicals properly – take paints, oils and household chemicals to appropriate disposal facilities. Don't pour them down the storm drain.

Pick up pet waste – it contains harmful bacteria that should not enter storm drains.

Sweep, don't hose – clean driveways and sidewalks with a broom to prevent debris from washing into drains.

Use fertilizers and pesticides responsibly – apply only when needed and never before it rains, or they'll end up in the drain.

Fix car leaks – repair oil and fluid leaks to prevent runoff pollution.

Wash cars on the lawn or at a car wash – prevent soapy water from flowing into storm drains.

Plant native vegetation – it helps absorb rainwater and filters pollutants.


Keep yard waste out of streets – leaves and grass clippings clog drains and carry nutrients that harm waterways.

Take these simple steps to protect our local waterways, wildlife, and community health and you'll be an H20 Hero! Remember, storm drains lead directly to rivers, lakes and oceans, with no treatment in between. Let's work together to ensure that only rain goes down the drain. Free Mulch for Pittsford Residents

Ever wonder what happens to all that wood and leaf debris the Town picks up? **We grind it into mulch for you! You can pick it up, free of charge, at the East Street storage bins** (enter at 34 East Street). You'll find the bins just before the gate to the Town Parks Department's offices. If you can haul it home, it's yours. Mulch is great for gardens as it helps retain water, suppresses weeds without toxic chemical use and improves soil structure, drainage and nutrient use.

Through the Town's yard debris recycling program we reduce landfill waste, pollution and greenhouse gas emissions. We help protect ecosystems and wildlife and are able to offer residents the practical benefit of **free mulch**.

Time to enjoy the outdoors. When you do, please keep your safety in mind.

• Wear a helmet, follow the rules of the road, and ensure you can be seen when bike riding. Make sure your kids do, too. Reflectors on the back of your bike, a light in front and bright clothing help make you more visible to motorists. For the safest ride, the bike frame should be the right size for the rider. Wear helmets when using scooters and skateboards, too.

• Keep pets, and yourself, safe from the heat – hot weather can be dangerous for anyone, especially kids and pets. Don't leave either unattended in a hot car. When it's 70 degrees outside, a car can heat up to over 100 degrees in just 20 minutes! When the air temperature is 77 degrees, asphalt reaches 125 degrees. If it's too hot for bare feet, it's too hot for paws! Keeping hydrated in the heat is important for pets and people alike – be sure you both drink plenty of water. Access to a shady spot or a cool area indoors during the hottest part of the day is important for us and our pets. Know the signs of heat-related illness.

- **Pool safety** pools should be inaccessible when not in use (locked, fenced, etc.). They should be supervised at all times when children are swimming. Be sure to use a pool alarm.
- **Campfire safety** never leave a campfire unattended. When you're done with a fire, douse it with plenty of water, making sure all of the embers – not just the glowing ones – are thoroughly wet. Always have water available. If you don't have enough water, use dirt to bury the embers. All fires should be at least 15 feet from anything that could burn. Extinguish the fire when you retire!
- Get active outdoors getting outside and keeping active is good for the mind, body and spirit. Summer is the perfect time to try a new activity or get back into the routine of a familiar favorite. It's also a great opportunity to enjoy outdoor games or sports with family and friends. Have fun, and be sure to remember the sunscreen.
