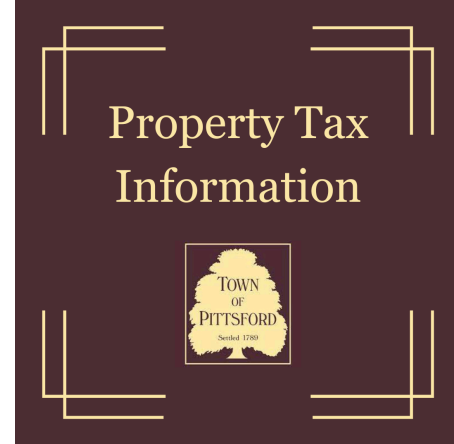

PROPERTY TAX PAYMENTS DUE BY 2/10

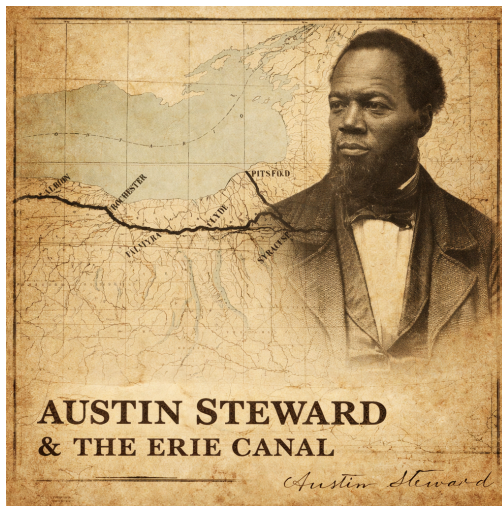
The interest-free Town and County property tax payment deadline is 2/10. First installments or full payments of your Town and County property taxes are due now. A payment coupon (see page 2 of the bill) must accompany your payment for efficient processing. Please include a phone number on your check.

How to make your payment:

- **By mail to:** Renee McQuillen, Receiver, 11 South Main Street, Pittsford, NY 14534
- **In person,** Monday through Friday, 8:00am to 4:00pm at Pittsford Town Hall, 11 South Main Street, or through the mail slots (into locked boxes) available 24/7, located at both the front and back entrances.
 - For cash payments, we ask that you bring the exact amount, and please call ahead for an appointment to ensure we have proper staffing
- **First Installments and full payments can also be made at Canandaigua National Bank, 18 State Street, in Pittsford Village, through February 10, 2026.**
- **Online** through Monroe County by credit card or check debit. Please note there is a 2.75% fee to pay by credit card and a sliding scale fee to pay by check debit. To pay online, click [HERE](#).
- **Reminder:** For those making installment payments, the second installment is due by February 28.



County Tax Law imposes interest on any payment made after February 10. **The Town has no authority whatsoever to waive or excuse payment of interest, regardless of the reason for late payment.** Therefore, by law, the Town is not permitted to do so.



BLACK HISTORY MONTH: AUSTIN STEWARD, THE ERIE CANAL, AND A PITTSFORD CONNECTION

The “Canal Age,” which took place roughly between the 1810s and the 1850s, saw the extensive construction of a network of engineered waterways. Canals reshaped how people, goods, and information moved across the states. They were built for commerce in a nation where much of the economy was sustained by slave labor.

The Erie Canal would prove to be different. Built to create a direct water route from New York City to the Great Lakes, bypassing the Appalachian Mountains, the canal opened up westward expansion, facilitated trade, and drastically lowered shipping costs. However, the same Erie Canal that helped move slave-produced goods would also become a critical pathway for communication, reform movements, and, for some, a route north toward freedom in Canada.

Austin Steward was an African American abolitionist, author, and businessman who escaped slavery and settled in Rochester. Steward opened a butcher shop just steps from the Erie Canal. His business afforded him the ability to participate in the abolitionist cause at a time when canal routes allowed reform ideas and publications to travel quickly between cities.

In 1831, Steward became involved with the Wilberforce Colony, a refuge in Canada for free Black families facing persecution in American cities. Many freedom seekers

traveled the canal to Buffalo, where they crossed Lake Ontario to safety. Historians note that communities along the canal developed strong abolitionist networks, and towns along the waterway later became associated with Underground Railroad assistance. One of those towns was Pittsford.

Judge Ashley Sampson is widely believed to have been a stationmaster on the Underground Railroad. He resided in the historic Hargous-Briggs House on South Main Street, a short walk from the canal. Local tradition suggests he hid those seeking freedom in a large, unused bake oven in the basement of his home.

Sampson lived during the same era and was roughly the same age as Steward. While no record confirms the two men ever met, both were connected to canal communities at a time when the waterway linked people, places, and causes. It's possible their paths crossed, or that they at least knew of one another.

What is certain is that heroes like Austin Steward and Underground Railroad stationmasters across New York were able to use the Erie Canal to further the abolitionist cause. Some slaveholders believed expanded canal networks would tie Northern commerce more closely to an economy sustained by enslaved labor. What they did not anticipate was that the Erie Canal would carry far more than commercial goods, moving ideas, literature, and people between places like Rochester, Buffalo, and Pittsford.

In one of history's great ironic twists, the canal built for commerce and expansion became a quiet corridor for courage, connection, and the long journey toward freedom.

A MESSAGE FROM THE VILLAGE OF PITTSFORD: CANAL USE & PERMITTING REMINDER

The New York State Canal Corporation has notified municipalities along the canal system that all activities on Canal property require a permit, regardless of whether the use is recreational, commercial, or personal.



These activities include but are not limited to:

- Ice skating
- Fishing
- Hockey or organized games
- Any other recreational or commercial use

Unpermitted use may be subject to fines issued by the Canal Corporation. Note that the village has no authority over canal property regarding enforcement. Please remember activities on the frozen canal may have significant safety issues, including the risk of a canal failure resulting in water flooding on the ice, imperiling the safety of those on the canal at the time of and after any such failure.

PITTSFORD PTSA HONORARY LIFE MEMBERSHIP AWARD NOMINATIONS NOW OPEN

Each spring, the Pittsford PTSA presents the New York State PTA Honorary Life Membership Award to community members who have gone above and beyond in serving Pittsford youth. The award recognizes individuals whose volunteer efforts or professional contributions exceed normal expectations and make a lasting impact on young people in our community.

Nominees must demonstrate dedication to Pittsford youth in three areas:

- Significant volunteer efforts or contributions beyond normal job responsibilities.
- Outstanding personal qualities that make them a positive role model.
- Ongoing willingness and availability to serve youth, directly or administratively.

Recipients are selected by a PTSA committee from nominations submitted by the wider Pittsford community. A list of past award recipients is available to view.

Nomination Process

The nomination process includes three phases:

- **Phase 1: Pre-Nomination Application (opens January 1; deadline February 13, 2026)**
- A lead sponsor submits the nominee's name, volunteer activities, and a brief statement describing how the nominee meets the criteria.
- **Phase 2: Support Letters (deadline March 27, 2026)**
- Approved nominees will require seven letters of support—one from the lead sponsor and six from community members—detailing the nominee's long-term contributions to Pittsford youth.
- **Phase 3: Recipient Selection**

- Recipients and sponsors will be notified by **March 29, 2026**, and invited to the ceremony.

THE LITTLE HOUSE OPEN THIS SATURDAY, FEB. 7

What was Pittsford in 1776? What remains of the Haudenosaunee presence and the earliest settlers after the Revolution?

Historic Pittsford's Little House, now more than 200 years old, will be open from **9:00am to noon**. The Little House is located at 18 Monroe Avenue in the heart of the Village, right next to the fire station. Many visitors have walked past this small, columned building and wondered what was inside. Here is the perfect chance to explore this two-room former lawyer's office and learn its history.



Historic Pittsford is preparing to commemorate the 250th anniversary of the American Revolution and is studying the period when this area was Haudenosaunee land and on the western frontier of settlement by former colonists and their families. We are interested in information about the Revolution, the Haudenosaunee, and the early post-revolution settlers. Please join them this Saturday for lively discussions!
